

Guidance for authors

MAIN JOURNAL

Articles for publication in the European Journal of Hospital Pharmacy Practice (EJHP-P) can cover any aspect of hospital pharmacy. EJHP will consider contributions to all sections. It is easiest for us to publish articles as whole number of pages. One page will hold a maximum of 4,500 characters and spaces in our standard font. We can accept a slightly longer page length if references are given, or a shorter length if tables, diagrams, etc. are included. If space allows, we will publish up to 7 references for a 1-page article, or 15 references if an article is 2 or more pages long. If there is no room to publish references, the reader will be referred to the author for correspondence, or the EJHP website, where the article will be published in full.

Authors are requested to supply a passport style photograph, either through the post, or in TIF or JPG format high resolution (300 dpi) by email.

Please supply also:

Author(s): author's names, highest academic degree, name of department and institution, city, country.

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REFERENCES

Number references consecutively in the order in which they are first mentioned in the text. Identify references in text, tables and legends by Arabic numerals in square brackets. Please follow the style given in the Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts Submitted to Biomedical Journals [1], except; if the number of authors is six or fewer, list all names or if the number of authors is seven or more, list only the first three followed by et al.

Author's names (initials preceded by surname, no periods after initials), complete title of the article, name of journal (Index Medicus abbreviation), year/month, volume, issue, page numbers.

PICTURES, GRAPHICS, FIGURES AND TABLES

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UNITS OF MEASUREMENT

Measurements of length, height, weight, and volume should be reported in metric units (metre, kilogram, or litre) or their decimal multiples. Temperatures should be given in degrees Celsius. Blood pressures should be given in millimetres of mercury. All haematological and clinical chemistry measurements should be reported in the metric system in terms of the International System of Units (SI). The symbol L for litre, is recommended in order to avoid the risk of confusion between the letter l and the number 1.

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Use only standard abbreviations. Avoid abbreviations in the title and abstract. The full term for which an abbreviation stands should precede its first use in the text unless it is a standard unit of measurement.

Original research, case reports and review articles will be considered for publication in the European Journal of Hospital Pharmacy Science (EJHP-S). High quality research papers, reviews and practice guidelines

in the field of hospital pharmacy practice, which fall outside of the scope and profile of the EJHP-S, may be considered for the section "Practice Research and Innovation" in the European Journal of Hospital Pharmacy Practice and are also subject to peer review. Prospective authors for either section are directed to the detailed Guidance for Authors printed in the European Journal of Hospital Pharmacy Science.
